Interested in Becoming a Civil Grand Juror?

The Riverside Superior Court is seeking qualified citizens to serve as civil grand jurors for the 2017/2018 term. Those interested in serving as a grand juror must have the following qualifications:

- Be a citizen of the United States
- Be 18 years of age or older
- Be a resident of Riverside County for at least one year prior to July 1, 2017
- Be of sound judgment and fair character
- ♦ Possess sufficient knowledge of the English language
- Se able to attend hearings and meetings three to five days a week.

Additionally, applicants cannot:

- Currently be serving as a trial juror in any court in California
- Have been discharged as a grand juror within the previous year
- Be serving as an elected public official
- Have been convicted of malfeasance in office, or any felony or high crime.



Duties include, but are not limited to investigating the operations of county government, researching matters of civic concern, and inquiring into public offenses. A per diem fee, plus mileage, is paid to defray expenses. Enjoy a Safe Grilling Season

Backyard barbecue grills are a popular sight in the region, and a few key safety practices can add to their enjoyment. Here are a few tips, as recommended by the National Fire Protection Association and Underwriters Laboratories/UL.

—D0:

- Keep your grill at least 10 feet away from your house. Farther is even better, and this includes portions attached to your house like carports, garages and porches. Grills should not be used underneath wooden overhangs, as fire could flare up into the structure above. This guidance applies to both charcoal and gas grills. Additionally, be sure to keep children and pets at least three feet from the grill area.
- Clean your grill regularly. If you allow grease and fat to build, they can provide more fuel for a fire. Grease is a major source of flare ups.
- Check for gas leaks. To ensure no gas is leaking from your gas grill, make a solution of half liquid dish soap and half water and rub it on the grill's hoses and connections. Then, turn the gas on (with the grill lid open.) If the soap forms large bubbles, that's a sign that the hoses have tiny holes or that the connections are not tight enough.
- Keep decorations away from your grill. Decorations like hanging baskets, pillows and umbrellas look pretty AND provide fuel for a fire. To make matters worse, today's decor is mostly made of artificial fibers that burn fast and hot, making this tip even more important.

- Keep a spray bottle of water handy. In this way, if you have a minor flare-up you can spray it with the water to instantly calm it. The bonus of this tip is that water won't harm your food.
- Keep a fire extinguisher within a couple steps of your grill, and know how to use it. If you are unsure how to use the extinguisher, don't waste time before calling 911. Firefighters say many fire deaths occur when people try to fight a fire themselves instead of calling for expert help and letting the fire department do its job.

-DON'T:

- Don't turn on the gas while your grill lid is closed. Never do this, as it causes gas to build up inside your grill. When you do light it and open it, the result can be a fireball that explodes.
- Do not leave a grill unattended. Fires double in size every minute. Plan ahead so that all of your other food prep chores are done and you can focus on grilling.
- 9 **Don't overload your grill with food.** This applies especially to fatty meats. The basic reason for this tip is that if too much fat drips on the flames at once, it can cause a large flare-up that could light nearby things on fire.
- Never use a grill indoors. People often think it will be safe to use a grill, especially a small one, indoors. This is not true. In addition to the fire hazard, grills release carbon monoxide a deadly colorless, odorless gas. That gas needs to vent in fresh air or it can kill.



- There are several ways to get the charcoal ready to use. Charcoal chimney starters allow you to start the charcoal using newspaper as a fuel.
- If you use a starter fluid, use only charcoal starter fluid. Never add charcoal fluid or any other flammable liquids directly to the fire.
- Keep charcoal fluid out of the reach of children and away from heat sources.
- There are also electric charcoal starters, which do not use fire.
 Be sure to use an extension cord for outdoor use.
- When you are finished grilling, let the coals completely cool before disposing in a metal container



Propane Grills

- If your grill has a gas leak, by smell or the soapy bubble test, and there is no flame, turn off both the gas tank and the grill. If the leak stops, get the grill serviced by a professional before using it again. If the leak does not stop, call the fire department.
- If you smell gas while cooking, immediately get away from the grill and call the fire department. Do not move the grill. If the flame goes out, turn the grill and gas off and wait at least five minutes before re-lighting it.

DON'T FORGET: Our Palm Tree Trimming Deadline

Indian Wells is known for its magnificent palm trees, including the date palm, fan palm, and other ornamental species which thrive in the desert. Our stately palm trees have a defined life span, and when they reach their later stages — often at heights from 50 to 70 feet representing 70-90 years in age — the trees can become susceptible to disease and insect infestation. These ailments can lead to a significant increase in browning and loss of palm fronds and/or loss of the crown at the top of the tree altogether — or even toppling of a tree. A high wind event may also worsen damage in a weakened tree, while falling fronds, crowns and trees can result in major property damage or harm to people if struck by debris.

Strong consideration should be given to removing trees in serious states of decline. Additionally, the City of Indian

Wells implements a regular program to inspect palm trees in public rights-of-way and on public property. The City strongly urges homeowners, property owners, HOAs, and business owners to regularly check the health and stability of palm trees located on their private property and private common areas by seeking professional advice from a landscape maintenance specialist and/or an ISA Certified Arborist.

Also, in order to comply with City ordinance provisions that ensure our neighborhoods remain healthy and clean, date palms must be trimmed by June 30. Washingtonians, fan palms, and other palm trees must be trimmed by July 30. You can avoid the unnecessary expense of repeat trimming by having your trees cut close to the deadlines after final bloom is assured.



Protect Your Mail This Vacation Season

Tips from Lt. Matt Martello, Indian Wells Police and Riverside County Sheriff's Department

Welcome to Lieutenant Matthew Martello, newest member of the Indian Wells Police Department. Lt. Martello began his career with the Riverside County Sheriff's Department in 1994 and has provided his valued services to Indio, Palm Desert, Thermal, Coachella and now Indian Wells. Recognized for his field and patrol experience, he was appointed several years ago to the Palm Desert Police Department's Special Enforcement Team, and he has also served as Assistant Chief of Police for the City of Coachella. Lieutenant Martello attended the College of Idaho and obtained a Bachelor of Arts Degree in Political Science. He and his wife, Wendy, have three children and have been residents in the valley for nearly 40 years.

Lt. Martello would like to help all residents to protect a very valuable asset — their mail, and he is pleased to share the following suggestions:

The holiday season is over and package deliveries and holiday mail have slowed down — but thieves continue preying on these items throughout the year. Some package thieves follow delivery trucks and then take the packages after the delivery is made. Others engage in crimes of opportunity, when thieves see packages in plain view of the street. The Indian Wells Police Department has steps you can take to reduce the chance that your deliveries will be stolen:

- ☑ Have your packages delivered to a location where someone can receive them in person, such as a neighbor or relative who is usually at home, or your workplace (if your employer allows it).
- ☑ Encourage your neighbors to watch for deliveries and agree to secure each other's packages. This includes being watchful for any person who is going onto porches for no apparent reason, or who is following delivery trucks around.
- ☑ Track deliveries online, or look

- into receiving a text notification to your cell phone when a package has been delivered. Many companies offer these services.
- □ Request a signature confirmation of delivery and arrange to be there to sign for the package. This is especially useful to consider for expensive, desirable or irreplaceable items.
- ☑ Provide delivery instructions. If packages will be left while you are not at home, try to have them left out of sight from the street.



- ☑ Deposit mail in a mail slot in the post office, at a Postal Service mailbox, or hand it to your letter carrier. Don't leave outgoing mail unattended in your mailbox for pick up.
- ☑ Pick up mail promptly. Don't leave it in your mailbox overnight. If you are expecting checks, credit cards or other valuable items, ask a friend or neighbor to pick up your mail.
- ☑ If you change your address, tell the Post Office and anyone else you do business with by mail.
- ₩ When going out of town, tell the Post Office and they can hold your mail until you return.
- mailbox. Ask your local postmaster for the most up-todate regulations on mailboxes.



Swimming Pool Safety Tips

With warm weather on its way, those involved in the supervision of children should be aware of the dangers associated with swimming pools and other bodies of water. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, approximately one in five people who die from drowning are children 14 and younger — with children ages one to four having the highest drowning rates.

Here are some key tips to prevent these needless tragedies:

- Never leave small children alone and unsupervised even for a few seconds. Know how to swim, and always have a "designated child watcher" who can swim too.
- If a child is missing, check the pool first. Go to the edge of the pool and scan the entire pool, bottom and surface, as well as the pool area.
- Anyone watching children should learn CPR and be able to rescue a child if needed.
- Do not use flotation devices as a substitute for supervision.
- Even if young children have had swimming lessons, they must be watched closely while they are swimming.

- Use an approved barrier to separate the pool from the house.
- Have life-saving devices near the pool, such as a pole/hook or flotation device.
- Keep children away from pool filters, as the suction force may injure them or prevent them from surfacing.
- If you leave the pool area, take the children with you.
- Keep large objects such as tables, chairs, toys and ladders away from pool fences. Do not allow children to play around the pool, and store all toys outside the pool area.
- Never swim alone, or while under the influence of alcohol or medications.

Never swim during storms with thunder and/or lightning.

Check the pool area regularly for glass bottles, toys or other potential accident hazards.

Keep CD players, radios, tablets, smartphones, laptops, and other electrical devices away from pools or nearby wet surfaces.

> For above-ground pools, steps and ladders to the pool should be secured and locked, or removed when the pool is not in use.

- Never dive into unfamiliar or shallow bodies of water.
- Don't swim if you're tired or have just finished eating.
- ▶ Post the 9-1-1 emergency number on all phones.

A New Baby Jaguar Arrives

Identified by their rosette style spots, jaguars are a solitary animal weighing between 100 to 250 pounds. The gestation period for jaguars lasts between 90-110 days, with the cubs staying with Mom for up to two years.

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

SCE Implementing "High Usage Charge"

Majority of customers will see higher monthly energy bills

SCE recently sent out letters to most of their customers introducing their "High Usage Charge" program. Any customer that uses in excess of 400% of the baseline allotment (Tier 1) in a given month, will be charged a penalty. The penalty can be as much as double the normal rate of electricity.



SCE gets to set the baseline amount and can change it throughout the year and for various regions. Our region has a baseline as low as 240kwh per month. Virtually every average household with an air conditioner and/or a pool, will be a Super-user and will incur extra charges. The result is that the majority of SCE's customers will see their monthly energy bills increase dramatically.

The only exemption is solar energy users. Homes with solar energy systems that provide over 90 percent of a home's annual energy needs will not exceed the baseline most months. In addition, most solar system owners have changed to a Time of Use rate plan. The High Usage Charge program does not apply to TOU customers.

What can you do to mitigate being deemed a Super User? Any steps a homeowner can take to minimize their electricity usage will help. Examples are installation of a variable speed pool pump, changing to LED bulbs, increasing insulation, and upgrading to high efficiency appliances and air conditioners. And of course installation of a solar energy system eliminates virtually all SCE energy charges and locks in energy rates against future Utility increases!

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SCE Making Changes to Net Metering

Decision will affect new solar system owners

Effective July 1, 2017 SCE and other California utility companies will reduce the amount of compensation for solar energy sent out to the grid. The result is less cost savings for solar energy system owners. "While the amount is quite small, it still alters the return-on-investment projections for homeowners looking at solar energy," commented Kirk Weiss, Planet Solar Vice President Sales. "And it continues electric companies efforts to discourage the installation of solar energy."

Net metering is an agreement between the utility company and the solar system owner. The owner receives credit for all excess power generated by their solar system and sent out to the grid. During non-producing hours, the owner pulls from their credits before incurring the cost of buying power from the utility. Net Metering 2.0 will change this.
