

STATE OF THE CITY: REVENUE OUTPACES EXPENSES

City residents gathered in the Mediterranean Ballroom at the Miramonte Resort & Spa on April 16 for an update on the City's progress in a variety of areas. During the one-hour presentation, the mayor and council members gave an overview of the City's achievements, which were many, despite the State of California's dissolution of redevelopment agencies that led to the City's loss of \$3.5 million annually for City operations. A question and answer session followed the presentation.




Highlights from the State of the City address included:

- The 40th anniversary BNP Paribas Open held this past March saw another record attendance with more than 450,000 tennis fans during the two-week event. The 2015 tournament brought in over \$2.4 million in admissions tax to the City.
- The Indian Wells Golf Resort enjoyed an outstanding year with continual improvements and the addition of the new Pavilion. The Golf Resort generated an additional \$1.3 million dollars of revenue for the City.
- The four Indian Wells hotel properties experienced a robust year, delivering \$6 million in transient occupancy taxes to the City's General Fund. This source equates to nearly 60 percent of the City's overall budget.
- The City of Indian Wells remains a leader in water conservation. The City has recovered more than \$100,000 in refunds from the Coachella Valley Water District for its water saving initiatives.
- The City has maintained its revenue above expenses for the last three fiscal years with expenses at \$13.8 million and revenues of \$15.2 million annually.
- According to a ten-year revenue forecast, the City's General Fund revenue is predicted to increase to \$20.2 million in 2024, up \$5 million from 2015 General Fund earnings of \$15.7 million.
- The City's new Strategic Plan outlines a number of objectives, including an expansion of economic development opportunities. Strategic Planning documents can be accessed online at www.cityofindianwells.org (click on City Hall/Strategic Planning).

This summer, Indian Wells will once again be joining in the Nine Cities Blood Drive Challenge. Regional blood collection has declined by 33 percent since 2005 with summer the most difficult time of year for hospitals to maintain ample blood supplies.

The City of Indian Wells will hold its Blood Drive on Friday, July 17, 2015 at the Indian Wells Golf Resort from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. The community that collects the most donations will be recognized with a plaque on Lifestream's "Tree of Life" at the donation center and headquarters in La Quinta, but the biggest winners of the Challenge are local hospital patients.

City Offers Free Vacation Home Checks

Are you leaving town for the summer or have a vacation planned? Before you leave, be sure to register in person at City Hall for a free Vacation Home Check. You can also take a proactive role preventing crime by doing the following:

- Stopping mail and newspaper delivery, and having someone you trust check for unscheduled deliveries.
- Ensuring your garage door is closed and any cars that must be left outside are locked.
- Placing valuables in a safe location, locking all doors and windows, setting burglar alarm and placing shims in track ways.
- Keeping your lawn, shrubbery and/or desertscape trimmed to avoid signaling your absence.
- Installing motion-activated lights throughout the exterior of your home, and putting interior lights on timers to simulate that someone is home.
- Letting your neighbors know you are away so that they can call 911 or the Sheriff's Department non-emergency number at (760) 836-3215 if they see or hear anything suspicious or unusual.

Why the Aggression?



Upon my arrival to the City of Indian Wells last September, I was awestruck by the weather, the location, and the beauty that makes up our city. In fact, one of my first articles for this newsletter was asking all of us to keep our "eyes up" and to enjoy the scenery, really trying to emphasize driving safely and not being preoccupied with our cell phones. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) cites extensive research into traffic collisions, their reasons, and ideas for prevention.

As I travel down Fred Waring Drive on Highway 111, I am in an unmarked regular car, and blend in with all of the other drivers on the road. However, I must constantly be defensive in my driving actions for a myriad of reasons. Of note, the top three reasons the NHTSA asserts for collisions and aggressive driving actions are: 1) in a hurry/behind schedule, 2) increased traffic congestion, and 3) inconsiderate drivers.

I find the first reason a sad occurrence in our city, but one in which my traffic enforcement officers often cite to me in taking collision reports. Indian Wells is one of the top vacation and leisure destinations in the world; yet traffic collisions occur primarily for reason #1.

If you are one who operates a motor vehicle in an aggressive, rushed manner, without regard for the safety of others, I urge you to slow down.

Make Pool Safety a Top Priority

As temperatures begin to climb and summer break approaches, kids will be clamoring for more pool time. Anyone involved with the supervision of children needs to be aware of the dangers associated with any body of water. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, approximately one in five people who die from drowning are children 14 and younger; with children ages one to four having the highest drowning rates. Below are some key tips to prevent these needless tragedies:

• Never leave small children alone and unsupervised — even for a few seconds. Know how to swim, and always have a "designated child watcher" who can swim too.

• If a child is missing, check the pool first. Go to the edge of the pool and scan the entire pool, bottom and surface, as well as the pool area.

 Anyone watching children should learn CPR and be able to rescue a child if needed.

• Do not use flotation devices as a substitute for supervision.

 Even if young children have had swimming lessons, they must be watched closely while they are swimming.

• Use an approved barrier to separate the pool from the house.

 Have life-saving devices near pool, such as a pole/ hook or flotation device.

• Keep children away from pool filters as the suction force may injure them or prevent them from surfacing.

• If you leave the pool area, take the children with you. Keep large objects such as tables, chairs, toys and ladders away from pool fences. Do not allow children to play around the pool and store all toys outside the pool area.

> • Never swim alone, or while under the influence of alcohol or medications.

 Never swim during storms with thunder and/or lightning.

 Check the pool area regularly for glass bottles, toys or other potential accident hazards.

 Keep CD players, radios, smartphones, laptops, and other electrical devices away from pools or nearby wet surfaces.

• For above ground pools, steps and ladders to the pool should be secured and locked, or removed when the pool is not in use.

- Never dive into unfamiliar or shallow bodies of water.
- Don't swim if you're tired or have just finished eating.
- Post the 9-1-1 emergency number on the phone.







Home Maintenance Checklist:

Don't Forget PALM TREE TRIMMING

Indian Wells is well known for its magnificent, stately palm trees including the iconic date palm, fan palms, and various other ornamental species.

Palm trees do have a life span and when they reach later stages — often at heights from 50-70 feet or over 70-90 years in age — the trees may become susceptible to disease and insect infestation. These ailments can often lead to a significant increase in browning and loss of palm fronds and/or loss of the crown at the top of the tree altogether, or even toppling of the trees. A high wind event may have a contributing effect on the damage to a weakened palm tree. Falling fronds, crowns and trees can result in major property damage and even harm to people if struck by debris. Serious consideration should be given to removing trees in serious states of decline.

The City of Indian Wells is on a regular program to inspect palm trees in public right-of-ways and on public property. The City strongly urges homeowners, property owners, HOAs, and business owners to regularly check the health and stability of palm trees located on their private property and private common area by seeking professional advice from a landscape maintenance specialist and/or an ISA Certified Arborist. If needed, the City can provide a list of private professional specialists and arborists.

Also, in order to comply with City ordinance provisions that ensure our neighborhoods remain healthy, clean and attractive, date palms must be trimmed by June 30. Washingtonians, fan palms, and other palm trees must be trimmed by July 30. You can avoid the unnecessary expense of repeat trimming by having your trees cut close to the deadlines after final bloom is assured.




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
