Sustainability. What does this ubiquitous buzz word really mean and why is it so critically important?

The most widely quoted definition of sustainability comes from the 1987 Report of the World Commission on Environment and Development (aka "Brundtland definition"). The report defines sustainability as "meeting the needs of the present without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs." Essentially, we must provide wise stewardship over our resources if the human race is to survive on this planet.


Early on, Indian Wells' city fathers envisioned this intricate balance of preservation and growth. In the past decade, City Council has taken a local, regional, and statewide leadership role in strategically assessing how we use our resources and how to mitigate environmental damage. Developing and launching the successful IW HEAL monetary incentive program, becoming California's first LED city, and partnering with Coachella Valley Water District to reduce water usage via smart irrigation controllers are among the many accomplishments to date. Moreover, in March 2008, City Council passed Resolution No. 2008-08, a vital piece of city legislation establishing that "energy conservation, sustainable development, alternative energy technologies, and 'best practices' in all these areas be incorporated into city planning and decision-making."

In 2010, the City of Indian Wells is set to implement its comprehensive sustainability plan entitled *Getting Greener: Indian Wells' Path to Sustainability*. The

Code Violations May Warrant a Fine Due to New Ordinance

In order to adhere to its premier model of municipal city government — one that emphasizes "best practices" in all areas including fiscal responsibility — Indian Wells City Council has adopted a new ordinance that changes the way city staff can enforce property nuisances.

To enforce property nuisance violations, the city had previously used the civil legal process. With the new ordinance in place, (City ordinance 631) staff may now use an administrative citations process. This new administrative citations process will save the city time and money, because the city will no longer need to go to court — an often costly and lengthy process — to compel compliance for violations

An administrative citation is essentially a civil monetary penalty assessed against the property or property owner for a specific

municipal code violation where there is no immediate health or safety danger.

Issuing administrative citations is a standard procedure for many cities and has been found to be very effective in achieving compliance for violations such as property maintenance, junk, trash and debris, vehicles parked on unimproved surfaces, illegal signs, illegal vendors, and trash cans in public view.

Please note that warnings will still be issued giving property owners a reasonable amount of time to rectify a specific property nuisance(s). However, code violations not fixed in a timely fashion may be subject to fines ranging from \$100 for a first offense to \$500 for repeated offenses within one year.

plan will take the city to the next level of sustainability by focusing on significantly improving energy efficiency in city buildings and programs, and encouraging conservation and the use of alternative and renewable energy sources throughout the community.

"The overall objective of the city's sustainability plan is to reduce the city's energy consumption by ten percent by the year 2012," says City Manager Greg Johnson.

The new plan showcases a multifaceted approach that includes four major categories and several proposed strategies: "Many Shades of Green" emphasizes community engagement and partnerships to help Indian Wells residential and commercial sectors lower their carbon footprint. Proposed initiatives in planning already underway include developing a city incentive plan, similar to the residential IW HEAL program but geared to the commercial sector, a Community Gardens project (see page 2), and educational outreach events like the October 5, 2009 solar energy forum, and new "Imagining the Future" series in partnership with UCR Palm Desert Graduate Center (see story on page 6.)

Other categories with specifically outlined action items include "Green Indian Wells," emphasizing green building guidelines for municipal buildings, and "Quality of Life" and "Thoughtful Development," which both focus on programs that promote sustainable development and public health.


